

Andrew didn't know what to expect when he got matched with Little Anthony, but Andrew always smiles to himself when he "gets to Anthony's house and sees the excitement barely held in check because he can't wait to go do something fun."



KAYLEIGH HENTGES & TALEYA / GOAL: COMMUNITY VALUES

With a new stepdad and stepsiblings in the home, Taleya's mom knew she would benefit from having a Big Sister.
